

38th International Conference of Data Protection and Privacy Commissioners

Marrakech, Morocco

Closed Session Report

In October 2016 the International Conference of Data Protection and Privacy Commissioners met in annual session for the 38th time. Delegations from 65 of the 115 accredited member authorities assembled in Marrakech and were joined by 16 accredited observers. The meeting was chaired by John Edwards, New Zealand Privacy Commissioner.
