

### 41st International Conference of Data Protection and Privacy Commissioners

#### Tirana, 2019

### **Closed Session Report on Proceedings**

In October 2019, the International Conference of Data Protection and Privacy Commissioners met in annual session for the 41<sup>st</sup> time. We welcomed more than 700 participants to the event across the week of Closed and Open Sessions. For the Closed Session, there were 220 participants and almost 50 speakers representing 90 data protection and privacy authorities, and many observers from various eligible sector categories.

The meeting was chaired by Elizabeth Denham, ICDPPC Executive Committee Chair and UK Information Commissioner.

## **ICDPPC** Resolutions

The Conference considered and adopted 5 resolutions.

The Resolution on the promotion of new and long-term practical instruments and continued legal efforts for effective cooperation in cross-border enforcement was presented by ICO Deputy Commissioner, James Dipple-Johnstone. The resolution was adopted by consensus. The Turkey data protection authority intervened to request to be added to the list of co-sponsors.

Adopted: Resolution on the promotion of new and long-term practical instruments and continued legal efforts for effective cooperation in cross-border enforcement.

The Resolution on privacy as a fundamental human right was presented by Daniel Therrien, OPC Canada Privacy Commissioner. The resolution was adopted by consensus. The Chile data protection authority intervened to request to be added to the list of co-sponsors. US FTC abstained because the resolution relates to matters outside the scope of its jurisdiction.

Adopted: Resolution on privacy as a fundamental human right. (US FTC abstained).

The Resolution to support and facilitate regulatory co-operation between data protection authorities and consumer protection and competition authorities to achieve clear and consistently high standards of data protection in the Digital Economy was presented by Elizabeth Hampton from the Office of the Australian Information and Privacy Commissioner and Brent Homan from OPC Canada.

Adopted: Resolution to support and facilitate regulatory co-operation between data protection authorities and consumer protection and competition authorities to achieve clear and consistently high standards of data protection in the Digital Economy.

The Resolution on social media and violent extremist content online was presented by John Edwards from OPC New Zealand. After some discussion about whether this kind of Resolution was aligned to the ICDPPC mission and whether it was within the remittance of all conference member data protection/privacy authorities, the Resolution was adopted by consensus. US FTC abstained because the resolution relates to matters outside the scope of its jurisdiction. 12.30 **Executive Committee** Raymond Liboro, ICDPPC **Elected**: The authority from 2019-2020 **Executive Committee Member** Argentina was elected to the 13.00 and Privacy Commissioner Executive Committee. of National Privacy Commission of the Philippines, introduced the candidate for the vacant seat to the Executive Committee. The candidate was Eduardo Bertoni, Director of the National Access to Public Information Agency of Argentina. Dr Bertoni gave a short oral statement in support of his candidacy. He was elected as the new member of the ICDPPC Executive Committee by consensus. Mr Liboro presented for adoption a clarification of the ICDPPC Conference Rules and Adopted: <u>amendment</u> to Procedures relating to the Chair and Rule 3.1. of the Rules and Executive Committee tenure. The Procedures. clarification was a technical amendment aimed at clarifying the process by which members of the Executive Committee, including the Chair, seek re-election as well as the procedure for stepping down should they not wish to renew their position for a second term, thereby improving transparency and organisation in the future ICDPPC Executive Committees. Following the adoption of the amendment, Mr Liboro introduced two candidates standing for re-election in the Executive Committee. These were Elizabeth Denham from the UK Information Commissioner's Office and Marguerite O. Bonane, President of the Commission Nationale de l'Informatique et des Libertés Burkina Faso.
