

43rd Global Privacy Assembly Closed Session Report on Proceedings 18 – 21 October 2021

In October 2021, the Global Privacy Assembly met in annual session for the 43rd time. The meeting was held online, hosted by the Mexican National Institute for Transparency, Access to Information and Personal Data Protection (INAI). The session was recorded by the Hosts and made available to participants for a limited time after the event. In total, more than 150 participants took part from across the GPA Members and Observers community on each day of the event.
