The Privacy Research Day is a multidisciplinary research event organized by the CNIL during which international researchers presented their work on different topics: smartphones and applications, Ai and expendability, economy of Privacy, tools for DPA, organisational challenges and user perspective

b. Please provide a full description of the initiative (no more than 350 words)

This interdisciplinary day was aimed at a broad audience familiar with privacy and data protection and regulation. The objective was to start a discussion between, legal experts, computer scientists, designers, researchers in social science... Researchers and experts from any field related to data protection were invited to attend and be part of the conversation.

The organizing committee for the Privacy Research Day received 120 submissions from the international community of researchers from the EU countries, such as Germany, Belgium, Spain, the Netherlands, as well as outside the EU: the US, Canada, United Kingdom and Singapore. After a careful selection or papers based on their academic merit, originality and relevance for the regulators, 18 papers were selected for presentation.

With Privacy Research Day, CNIL offered a forum for an interdisciplinary research and exchanges around the broad topic of privacy and data protection and regulation: 18 groups of researchers in law, computer science, sociology, design and economy presented their works at the Privacy Research Day. Moreover, almost 40% of presented articles were multi-disciplinary, which shows that researchers today collaborate across disciplines to address a complex problem of privacy and data protection within today's society and emerging technologies.

For attendants, this was also the chance to discover innovative research: new vulnerabilities, tools and solutions were presented. More than 3,000 visitors followed the first Privacy Research Day online, and 281 people registered to attend it at the CNIL premises.

c. Please explain why you think the initiative deserves to be recognised by an award (no more than 200 words)

This conference offered the opportunity to create bridges between researchers and regulators. During the day, experts in different fields presented their works and discuss their impact on regulation and vice-versa.

The presentations were aimed for a large audience and, due to the involvement of the presenters, it was very accessible and understandable. The format of the conference included short presentations to present a topic followed by panels and Q&A session.

Because we aimed at an international audience, the event was in English and broadcasted online. More than 3,000 visitors followed the first Privacy Research Day online.

This conference highlighted the importance of cross-disciplinary research, it is, to the best of our knowledge, the first of its kind.
